
Many years ago, 20 maybe, maybe a bit more, I had an idea that I might like to make a show in an underwater environment. My theatre ideas usually come from movement and I figured there might be something interesting about seeing the human body performing in water—that it might have another kind of poetry to it other than the body moving in air.

The show's themes emerged as myself and the brilliant Kellie Hughes, our director, began working in the studio, making movement sequences and bringing that movement into water and back onto land again to rework it and then back to the water ... because nothing in air and water is the same! Little by little we've made Oh ...

The show itself is a journey into the unconscious. Those places within ourselves, that for the most part, remain unknown. As the show evolved, the most prevalent theme became that of loss. A man lost within himself, at a loss as to where to go, a man dealing with the loss that comes with death ... It became a journey to the holding places within ourselves, where our subconscious meets up with grief, sadness and the gorgeous resilience within us that can bring us back to joy.

I'd like to dedicate the show to my Dad, Frank Murphy and to my great pal Sé Purcell.

Directing work includes Waiting for Godot [Theatre Du Pif, Hong Kong]; The Far Off Hills [Nomad Theatre Network]; Toraiocht [Fibin]. Other directing work includes Falling out of Love [Yew Tree]; Focal Point [TEAM]; B for Baby [Abbey]; The Second Coming [Fidget Feet/Hawk's Well Theatre]; The Walworth Farce, Penelope [Druid] and Arrah na Pogue [Abbey Theatre].

Kellie is an Irish theatre artist, working nationally and internationally, as a director, writer and collaborator. Previous work with Galway International Arts Festival includes; Unspeakable Conversations, in collaboration with Liz Carr, Matt Frazer, Olwen Fouérè and Christian O'Reilly; Death At Intervals, adapted from José Saramago's novel As Intermitências da Morte and created in collaboration with Olwen Fouéré and Raymond Scannell: Samuel Beckett's prose piece Lessness, co-created with Olwen Fouéré and Sarah Jane Scaife; and co-direction of riverrun. Olwen Fouéré's award winning adaptation of the voice of the river Liffey/Life in James Joyce's Finnegans Wake.

Kellie is Artistic Director of the Ad Astra Academy Performing Arts creative mentorship programme in University College Dublin.

Sabine Dargent

Sabine has won two Irish Times Best
Set-Design Awards and being nominated
for two others. Sabine worked in Ireland
with numerous dance and theatres
directors and companies such as Mikel
Murfi, Oona Doherty, Michael Keegan
Dolan, Oona Doherty, Emma Martin, Junk
Ensemble, Conall Morrison, Enda Walsh,
Brokentalkers ... and a lot more. She also
worked in France with Serge Noyelle,
Lucio Fanti, compagnie TGV.

She was artistic director for 11 years, with Muirne Bloomer, on the project produced by Saint Patrick Festival, designing pageants, costumes, props and floats with 250 participants each year. She loves theatre and dance, physical theatre, but has also designed for exhibitions, films, events and street theatre.

Sinead Wallace

Sinéad works as a lighting designer for Theatre, Opera and Dance throughout Ireland. She has received Irish Times Theatre Awards for Best Lighting three times between 2007 and 2010. Sinéad's recent lighting designs include Audrey or Sorrow, Tartuffe & iGirl [Abbey Theatre], Bajazet, The Lighthouse & Least Like The Other [Irish National Opera] and In Middletown [Gate Theatre] She has worked extensively for The Abbey Theatre, Corn Exchange and Irish National Opera. as well as for Irish National Opera, The Gate Theatre and Liz Roche Company. Sinéad is particularly interested in sustainable theatre making and has been involved in drafting The Lir Academy's Sustainability Policy and Action Plan.

Proudly from Cork, Sandra O'Mahony has worked nationally and internationally in Theatre and Rock n' Roll Sound for the last 30 years. Sandra has been GIAF's Heineken® Big Top Stage Manager for many years.

Declan Gibbons

Declan Gibbons has worked in theatre and arts organisations for all his adult life and has served as General Manager of Macnas, Managing Director of Druid, Project Manager on the refurbishment of the Mick Lally Theatre, Manager of Galway Film Centre, Director of Galway City of Film, is now Operations Manager with Galway International Arts Festival, and acts as a Producer for Loco & Reckless Productions.

His passion is music and he was the guitarist with Mary Coughlan when she began her career, played with The Sleepwalkers who were very famous in Galway in the 1990s and has written music for Macnas and Baboró International Arts Festival for Children. He has the unique kudos of having a character in *Breaking Bad* named after him – Declan, a bad guy from Phoenix in S5E6! This is his first show working under water.

Maurice McKiernan

In 1977 Maurice played alongside Mikel in a school production of the Wild Rover. Maurice, realising his acting career, at the tender age of 13, had peaked [with great acclaim], wisely chose a life in Civil Engineering. Mikel on the other hand continued to tread the boards with ever areater success. After more than four decades, the two old school friends reconnected, and while sat on the slopes of Knocknarea, with the wild Atlantic laid out before them, catching up on their lives, Mikel spoke of his lifelong intention to stage an underwater show. Maurice smiled to himself and knew; it was time for his second career change! He is delighted to reunite with Mikel and share with him his knowledge of all things diving. Everything else? Well, Maurice will figure it out as he goes along!

Pete Jordan

Peter graduated from Galway Youth Theatre in 1997 and since then has worked extensively in Theatre, Dance and Opera. So thankfully this is not his first time working with sharks.

Lisa Mahony

Lisa studied Drama and Theatre studies at Trinity College, Dublin and has worked

for more than a decade as a freelance production manager. She also worked for several years as a venue technician at the Project Arts Centre and was the first Head of Lighting at The Lir Academy.
